WE ARE DRILLING

Thanks to the generosity of our supporters, we're in the final stages of drilling a new well at the horse ranch in Cerrillos.

In an amazing display of generosity our wonderful donor Jackie Counter donated \$108,000 to our well fund bringing the total contributions to \$110,500.

We are deeply grateful for her ongoing support (she also sponsors our horse Natilla).

Thank you, Jackie and to all that contributed to this fund. We started drilling in October and are happy to report we have a good well and are in the final stages of installation. This new well will provide plenty of water for our horses and operations far into the future.

Brianna Gooch has been a valued member of The Horse Shelter community since 2018—first as a volunteer, then as an adopter (of the beloved Tango), and now as a key contributor to our training team. Brianna serves as our “progression rider,” the person who takes horses that have been started under saddle by our colt starters and continues their education until they’re ready for adoption. Her thoughtful approach and steady presence have made her an essential bridge between early training and forever homes.

Originally from Virginia, Brianna began riding at age five despite not coming from a horsey family. She grew up in the Hunter discipline, riding and competing with lesson horses before eventually becoming a horse owner herself. After relocating

to New Mexico with her partner, Farrier Rachel Lynn—who also has deep ties to THS—they quickly connected with our shelter, and we’re so grateful they did.

Since stepping into the Progression Rider role in January 2025, Brianna has helped guide several horses into successful adoptions, including Pixie, Snickers, Jill, and Kelsey. THE REMARKABLE JOURNEY OF LEE

What's possible when rescue, care, and love meet opportunity.



Lee today—her grace and the deep connection she shares with her rider. These images speak louder than words about the impact of rescue, the patience of training, and the power of trust.

Every now and then, a story comes along that reminds us exactly why we do this work.

In 2013, The Horse Shelter took in five young foals who had been separated from their mothers during a roundup and were bound for slaughter. One of those foals was a petite weanling we called Chinle—quiet, alert, and full of unspoken promise.

Four years later, she entered our 2017 Gimme Shelter training event with Wyatt Mortenson. That experience laid the foundation for what would become a life-changing partnership.

Today, Chinle—now known as Lee—is not only thriving, she's turning heads across the Southwest as the trusted mount of young rider Emma Ortiz.

Since her adoption in 2013, Lee has become a standout competitor, traveling throughout New Mexico and Arizona with Emma. The pair has competed in barrel racing, poles, and breakaway roping—earning a saddle in the 2023 Rodeo de Santa Fe Summer Barrel Racing Series. That same year, they

won the Sandoval County Fair Queen title, again bringing home a saddle.

Most recently, Emma was crowned the 2025 Rodeo de Santa Fe Queen, proudly riding Lee during grand entries, flag runs, and hot laps. If you caught the event on The Cowboy Channel, you likely saw Lee carrying the New Mexico state flag—a former rescue horse leading the charge in a celebrated rodeo tradition.

Emma's mother shared:

"She has taught my daughter so much—about patience, connection, trust. Lee's bond with her is something truly special. She's grown into this absolutely stunning mare with the most incredible presence, and people are always surprised to learn she's a rescue. We proudly tell everyone she came from The Horse Shelter. We're so grateful to be part of her story."

So are we. Lee's transformation is proof of what's possible when rescue, care, and love meet opportunity.

Preventing Refeeding Syndrome

REFEEDING A MALNOURISHED HORSE

In our last newsletter, we introduced the Henneke Body Condition Scoring System to help you recognize different levels of malnourishment in horses. When it comes to refeeding a starving horse, careful management, veterinary supervision, and precise nutritional planning are critical for safe recovery.

Begin by feeding small, frequent meals made up of high-protein forages such as alfalfa or high-quality grass hay.

Avoid offering grains or calorie-dense concentrates during the initial stages. Introducing these too soon can trigger Refeeding Syndrome—a life-threatening condition that occurs when an emaciated horse is reintroduced to nutrition too rapidly. This syndrome can cause severe metabolic disturbances, organ failure, and even death over the following days or weeks.

If you encounter a starving horse, do not throw a bag of grain over the fence. Instead, contact us or the appropriate law enforcement agency. With proper intervention, the horse can receive the specialized care it needs for a safe and successful recovery.
